EASTER SUNDAY IS A REMINDER

Are you ready for Easter Sunday? It arrives on April 20th. When our two children were preschool and elementary school age, getting ready for Easter included: new outfits, Easter baskets filled with chocolate bunnies and peeps, decorating hard boiled eggs, hunting for eggs hidden in the yard, attending Sunrise Service at Paul Cemetery, and a joy filled celebration at our church.

There is, however, more to getting ready for Easter Sunday. For followers of the Lord Jesus, Easter Sunday is a REMINDER that we don't need to be afraid of death! We don't need to be fearful about our own future death! We don't need to be filled with fear when we think about the future passing of our believing loved ones.

I'll be honest, however, I'm more than a little anxious about what my last days might look like. I pray that like Enoch, I will be going about the work of serving the Lord, and then I will be "no more, because God took (me)" to my heavenly home. Read *Genesis 5:21-24*. Or in my more fanciful dreams, like Elijah, I would be caught up in a tornado like wind into heaven. Read 2 Kings 2:1-12. We can pray for a peaceful passing, knowing full well God may allow something different.

Now when it comes to my believing loved ones going to be with Jesus, I want to go first. I don't want to have to experience the sorrow and grief of saying an earthly goodbye. Again, the Lord may have other plans.

Back to death and the dying process.

Most of the time, we can successfully avoid thinking about the dying process and our final breath. But then, the Bully Death catches us as we are going about the everyday business of life and taunts us with the words: "You, too, will die someday!" Bully Death's goal is to make us so afraid of dying that we stop living.

As followers of Christ, we don't need to be afraid of the Big Bully. Why? Because we don't face him alone. We have a Big Brother. Read these words from Hebrews 2:14-15 (The Message):

14-15 Since the children are made of flesh and blood, it's logical that the Savior took on flesh and blood in order to rescue them by his death. By embracing death, taking it into himself, he destroyed the Devil's hold on death and freed all who cower through life, scared to death of death.

So, on Easter Sunday and every Sunday, Christians (that's us) gather to praise and worship our Big Brother Jesus! And to thank Him for defeating Bully Death, so that we don't need to be afraid of death—our own death and the death of our believing loved ones.

PALM BRANCH — When Jesus entered Jerusalem days before his death, crowds welcomed him by waving palm branches, common symbols of victory and rejoicing. 



Easter insights



Did you know the word *Easter* never appears in the Bible? It may be a variant of the name Eostre, a pagan fertility goddess who symbolized rebirth anspring. *Eostre* stems from the Proto-Germanic word for *dawn*, which Christians connect to Jesus' victory over darkness.

The ancient tradition of Easter baskets also has ties to Eostre, whose symbol was a rabbit. Christians likely adapted the practice of bringing eggs and seeds as an offering to Eostre. Some Orthodox Christians continue a tradition of having a priest bless baskets of Easter food on Holy Saturday. Items usually hold special symbolism, such as Paska bread, cured meats, colored eggs, salt, horseradish and lamb-shaped butter.

A Broken Chrysalis

It's truly amazing what a girl will do for love.

My wife, Jean, and I lived next door to each other for ten years before we were married. My sophomore interest in high school biology had sparked a live caterpillar collection. Their home was a shoe box, covered with screen wire. When I went on vacation, Jean fed them faithfully with leaves from her willow tree. She hated it.



Finally the caterpillars stopped their incessant crawling and chewing, attached their tails firmly to a stick and lay still, sheathed with a shiny leather-like case. For weeks they seemed to be dead, unmoving in their tiny gray wrappings. I removed the screen and waited.

One by one, the gray cases began to twist and turn violently, and suddenly split open. A beautiful butterfly emerged. It stood for hours gently moving its wings, pumping fluids into them to extend them fully. Then the butterfly soared gracefully away on the breezes of summer, leaving nothing behind but a broken chrysalis to indicate its former bondage.

The chrysalis and butterfly suggest the empty graveclothes of our risen Lord. When Peter and John heard the news that the Lord's body was gone from the garden tomb, they ran all the way from their lodging. Peter entered the tomb and "he saw the strips of linen lying there, as well as the burial cloth that had been around Jesus' head. The cloth was folded up by itself, separate from the linen" (John 20:6-7, NIV). The graveclothes once wrapped continuously around the body now lay collapsed, mute testimony that the corpse they had once shrouded had now emerged in life.

The bondage of death is broken. Christ is risen! We can face tomorrow with the assurance that Jesus is in fact alive to help us, to guide us, to give us hope for the future. And since He is living, our problems are not insolvable. The broken chrysalis of His graveclothes proclaims that Christ is Victor even over death.

Because He lives, nothing is impossible.
